CCBA Honey Booth, June 2021



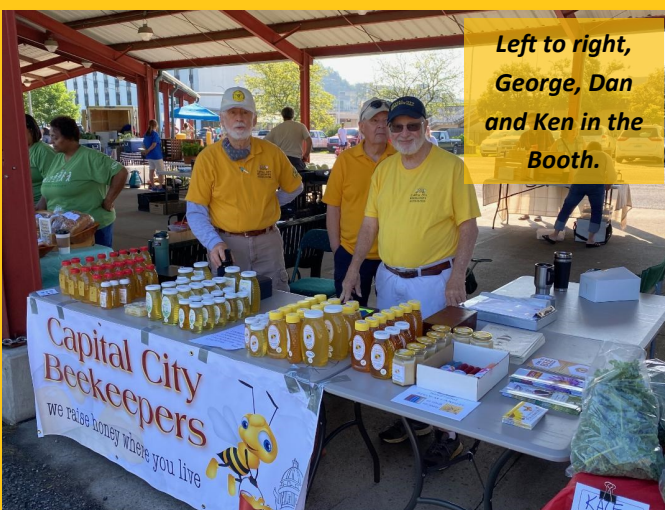

Hand rolled beeswax candles were offered too.

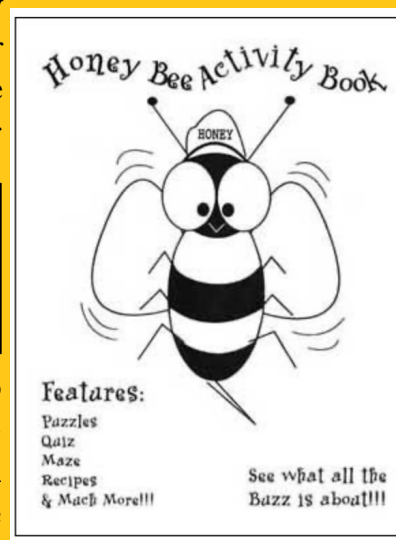

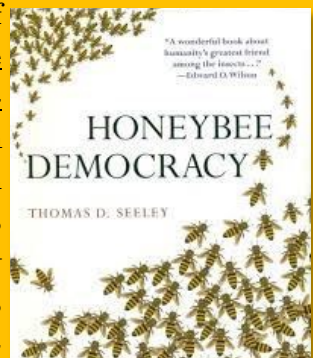
1. Materials are available for active members to check out.

Program

Meeting

President Wes Henry called this month's meeting to order at 7:07 p.m. and expressed our appreciation to Jack for leading this evening's program.

For the second time this year, we were able to meet in a hybrid environment including six members attending live.

The first item on the agenda was a request for a motion to approve the minutes of our April meeting. With no comments and/or objections, the minutes were passed.

Treasurer George Fowler stated that only two members received checks from Wilson Nurseries for honey sales. He also provided the monthly fiscal report, which will be in our next newsletter. With no objections, the financial report was approved.

Activity Reports

Swarm Report:

Swarming activity is calming down. There were several each week in the past month, including a couple in one day.

Library Report

Librarian George Fowler requested reimbursement for his purchase of *Honeybee Democracy* by Dr. Thomas Seeley. Wes made a motion for reimbursement of \$24.84. Lynn Morris seconded the motion and it unanimously approved. George added that two other books were added to our library.

Old Business

KSU Autoclave:

The subject of the autoclave was tabled for the present, since we have had no recent news from "J. J.", who does the autoclave scheduling. Our location here at the Co. Extension Office is a very good site for the autoclave and maybe we will be able to host it in the fall. Sarah Conn asked if there is a current schedule for the autoclave's locations. Wes said that he did not know but he would email "J. J." and Dr. Tom Webster to see.

Eastern Apicultural Society:

This year's meeting of the [EAS](#) will be held on the 11th thru the 13th in Shepherdsville. Our own Marsha Bezold will be one of the three hundred attendees.

Farmers Market:

Ken Daniels and Dan Ramey were the only members who sold honey at our honey booth at the first Franklin County Farmers Market of the year. The next market will be June 12th. With taste testing not allowed, sales will be hurt. We are also out of coloring books for the kids. Honey prices are \$18 for a pound and a half jar, \$12 for a pound jar, and \$7 for a half pound jar.

Frame Shortage:

KSBA held its annual spring meeting on May 8th. The guest speaker, Dr. Mike Hood, gave an excellent presentation on hive beetle. KSBA members applications are available at kybees.org. Dues can be paid online or by downloading the form and sending the fees to the address provided.

Apiary Opportunity:

Wes announced that the Stonehedge Farm in Woodford County would like to have someone establish and maintain an apiary on their property. He said that he inspected the farm, was quite impressed and is an excellent site for bees.

From the Floor:

Ken Daniels said that we still have some T-shirts available for \$15 and polo shirts available for \$26.

Ralph Davison asked about the correct mite treatment in June and if feeding light syrup will affect the honey produced. The answers are Mite Away Quickstrips and 'No' respectively.

Michael Wiley asked for opinions on when combining two weak hives, whether to keep the wild queen from one hive or the apiary queen from the other. After some discussion the decision seemed to be to combine the hives with both queens and let the stronger win.

Armando Arrastia is in need of assistance in moving some hives. Anyone willing to assist should contact him.

At 7:58 p.m. George less than reluctantly made a motion for adjournment. There was no objection and the meeting was closed.

Topics being developed for the conference include: how to inspect hives, checking for varroa mites with sugar shakes and alcohol washes, brood diseases in the hive, queen considerations (identifying, requeening), how to make splits, sampling to test for *Tropilaelaps* and testing for hygienic qualities.
