THE 'KEEP'S TO DO LIST

- Extract capped honey or test moisture on uncapped honey before extraction.
- Prepare and properly store "cleaned" surplus honey comb to prevent moth and mouse damage.
- Do mite washes and apply correct miticide for environmental conditions (see label).
- Continue to manage nucs/ splits- move to or add hive body or make room. Remember, nucs will swarm!
- As dry times come in summer and with "The Dearth" be ready to feed colonies light on stores.

A DIY Mite-Wash Kit

One of the most useful and important disciplines in beekeeping is have everything ready before you open the hive. Having a basic and most useful mite wash kit at the ready and easy to transport is one of those things to have. Everything can be packed securely (See below) and easily transported in the small tub (Fig. 1) also used to collect the shaken bees from the frame. Paper towels (Fig.2) are used to wipe clean items, especially the wash container (Fig.3) between washes. Rubbing alcohol (Fig. 4) or "non-sudsing" soap such as windshield





washing fluid, can be used. The 1/2 cup measure is use to scoop the measured amount of bees (approx. 300 bees) from the tub to be quickly dumped into the wash container for "washing". The mini strainer (Fig.6) with a paper towel can filter mites and debris to reuse alcohol or soap. The funnel (Fig. 7) allows recycled liquid to be returned to the wash container or the original bottle without mess or loss. <u>See mite-wash method here</u>

June's Program Part 2: <u>Mite Wash</u>

The June meeting ended in the apiary with a mite wash preformed on both colonies. President Wes Henry instructed using an alcohol mite wash. One colony was below the 3% threshold while the other was well above with 6% and action was taken by Jack Kuhn the next day. Another wash is set for July's meeting to measure efficacy.
