THE 'KEEP'S TO DO LIST

- Honey supers should be on production colonies. Add supers as they are filled.
- Be prepared to make "splits" to prevent swarming.
- If you find "swarm cells" make splits. Swarm cells make best queens.
- Have equipment ready to catch swarms when called.
- Continue to feed installed package/ nucs until they quit taking during the honey flow.



March 28th, 2023

30 members & guests were in attendance at the March meeting.

Introduction of Tana Peers, Honey Judge. She was there to quilt, but just stopped in to say hi and encourage members to enter honey in the county fair.

Program

Dr. Tammy Horn Potter, Kentucky State Apiarist, presented. She introduced herself and passed out the new Kentucky Beekeeping flier from the Kentucky Department of Agriculture with QR codes to current programs. She described her job responsibilities as 1) Hive Health 2) Economic Development and 3) Education and Outreach. She talked about threats to the bees, including the Asian Murder Hornet, now known as the Giant Northern Hornet, passing around examples of this threat, and the less harmful, European Hornet which is common in Kentucky. The new threat to Kentucky agriculture is the Spotted Lantern Fly which is not harmful to the bees, but can affect the taste of the honey.

Wes Henry spoke after business meeting about early splits using a double screen board.
