Sydnie will make appearance throughout the fairgrounds and will be present at the Kentucky State Beekeepers Association exhibit, promoting its Certified Kentucky Honey Program.



Sydnie is the 20-year-old daughter of Thea

Weinberger of Eau Claire, WI, and Jack Paulsrud of Augusta, WI. Prior to serving as a spokesperson for the beekeeping and honey industry, she studied childcare services in college. Hailing from Chippewa Falls, WI, Sydnie also works for DHL-Fleet Farm Distribution Center.

As the 2020 American Honey Princess, Sydnie serves as a national spokesperson on behalf of the American Beekeeping Federation, a trade organization representing beekeepers and honey producers throughout the United States. The American Honey Queen and Princess speak and promote in venues nationwide, and, as such Princess Sydnie has traveled throughout the United States in 2020.

The beekeeping industry touches the lives of every individual in our country. In fact, honey bees are responsible for nearly one-third of our entire diet, in regards to the pollination services that they provide for a large majority of fruits, vegetables, nuts and legumes. This amounts to nearly \$19 billion per year of direct value from honeybee pollination to United States agriculture.

Capital City Beekeepers Association Meeting Minutes of 23 June 2020

<u>NOTE</u>: Due to the Coronid-19 outbreak, the meeting was once again conducted by means of videoconferencing through Zoom. We very grateful to Adam Leonberger of the Franklin County Cooperative Extension for once again making this possible.

Program:

Jack Kuhn and Wes Henry did a live Facebook broadcast at 6:00 p.m. inspecting our three hives. The top-bar is doing well with a new queen. One Langstroth hive is doing very well and had honey harvested. The second Langstroth isn't doing so well and needs to be re-queened. The entire evening's program is available for viewing on our Facebook page.

Meeting:

President Wes Henry called the meeting to order at 7:01 p.m. He called for the approval of the May meeting minutes, as printed in the newsletter. There were no comments, which was taken as an approval. The same held true for the financial report as presented by treasurer, George Fowler. George mentioned that he had one new family membership and one new individual membership during the past month.

Activity Reports:

Swarm Report:

The association received three calls this month. One was for bees in a building in Lexington and that call information was passed on to the Bluegrass Beekeepers Assoc. The second call was west of Lawrenceburg for a hive in an old oak tree that was to be removed. Jim Psiones answered this call and got around 5 lbs. of bees on his initial visit. Enough bees remained that the landowner requested that Jim return, which he did and got about another 3 lbs. of bees. The secretary responded to a swarm south of Versailles and was able to capture a swarm. Other members reported on swarms that they, or someone that knew, had also caught.

Library Report:

Librarian George Fowler asked Co. Extension Agent, Adam Leonberger, if there was a place at the extension office where our meager library might be stored. Adam said that there was an area in the lower level that the extension office was getting new lockers and wants all lockers and that he would get back to George. George said that if there was room for a rolling cart that that would be great.

Old Business:

Farmers Market:

The we will resume our booth at the Frankfort Farmers Market in July. Our day will be the second Tuesday and Saturday of the month. New restrictions include no honey tasting, no honey straws, only two people in the booth at a time, masks and gloves must be worn and routine disinfecting is required. Wes has our tables and a washstand. A second washstand will also be available.

Shirts:

Ken Daniels reported that a few shirts are still available and individual orders can be made.

Bluegrass Beekeeping School:

George reported that only one school remains that has yet to cash our check from the hive paintings.

Kentucky State Fair:

Wes reported that the officers of the KY State Beekeepers Assoc. had held a meeting to discuss this year's representation at the State Fair. It was decided that the KSBA will again have two booths, one for honey sales and the other for the Certified KY Honey Program. Three volunteers at a time will be allowed to work the honey booth which will be a 10'x10' canopy in the West Wing courtyard. The CKHP booth is for information only, may have two volunteers and will be situated in the South Wing parking lot.

Hours for this year's fair are from 2 p.m. until 10 p.m. on weekdays and noon to 10 p.m. on Saturdays and Sundays. The only honey that will be sold this year will be 1 and 2 lb. jars, creamed and combed. There will not be honey straws, candy, candles or other bee products for sale. There also will be no honey judging. All the products for the day must be in the booth as there is no storage space. KSBA will have a required form to be filled out by those wishing to sell honey, and the logistical details regarding dropping of and picking up of the product are being worked out now. Sarah Preston mentioned that plastic bottles sell better than glass at the fair.

Due to the reduced hours, it was suggested that CCBA work the entire eight-hour shift on Tuesday the 25th of August, which would normally be our meeting night. Four members, and possibly a fifth, said that would/should be able to work.

New Business:

KSBA will hold a meeting / field day at the Perryville Battlefield on July 25th. Participation is limited to 50 people and reservations must be made through the KSBA. Boxed lunches will be available. Registration fees for KSBA members is \$10 and for non-members it is \$25, which included KSBA membership.

Thoughts about how we would hold our July meeting were discussed. Since gathering restrictions have be changed to 50 people at a time, from 10, it was thought that we could meet in one of the area parks in a pavilion or something similar. The secretary was given the task of checking into the availability and feasibility of different sites and rental fees in the Franklin Co. and Frankfort parks systems.

Adjournment:

With nothing from the floor, Sarah made motion to adjourn, George seconded, and the motion was approved at 7:42 p.m.
