2019 KY State Fair



The day dawned August-hot and humid (fair weather) as members of the CCBA met as in years past the Frankfort Walmart parking lot to make the drive to Louis-ville to the Kentucky State Fair. Each year the Association works the KSBA Honey booth in the West Wing of the State fair and conventions center where members of KSBA from around the state can sell their honey. Local associations like CCBA schedule times and dates to do the same and a portion of the proceeds from that day's sale is given back to the participating association's. According to 2019 KSBA state president Chris Renfrow, there had already been record sales.

This year was the first for the Certified Kentucky Honey Program and though beekeepers that were certified had their honey at the traditional booth in the west wing, another honey booth in the south wing (Ag Land) was dedicated to selling nothing but Certified Kentucky Honey (see Picture pg 3.). We also had the opportunity as always, interacting with folks and talking bees, honey, old times, and beekeeping and taking a break or two to enjoy the fair itself.

"The Kentucky Certified Honey Program (KCHP) was established by KSBA in an effort to promote the sale of local honey to consumers in Kentucky. We wish to promote the many beekeepers in Kentucky that raise their bees, harvest, process their honey, and sell their honey all within the State of Kentucky. All beekeepers within the State of Kentucky are eligible for certification by making formal application to KSBA and paying the appropriate annual dues. The annual dues include membership in KSBA at no extra cost. Each local association will receive \$3 back for each of its members that become certified...As Certified Honey Producers, beekeepers will have agreed to follow the program guidelines and to apply the certified honey label with a registered trade symbol to the bottles of honey that they sell. Capital City Beekeepers Association Meeting Minutes of 23 July, 2019

Meeting:

President Wes Henry called the meeting to order at 7:04 p.m. and asked for a motion to accept the minutes of the June meeting as they were published in the newsletter. Michael Wiley made the motion, Dan Ramey seconded it, and the members present carried the motion.

In the absence of Treasurer George Fowler, Wes called for a motion to approve the financial report as it was also published in the newsletter. Eddie McNutt made the motion, Kay Daniels seconded and the motion was approved.

Committee Reports:

Swarm Committee – the secretary reported that no swarms had been reported within the last month. Wes Henry said that he caught a small swarm and Eddie McNutt stated that he caught a large swarm, which was from his colonies.

Wes announced that so far three members have used our extractor.

<u>Farmers Market</u> – Ken Daniels reported that at he and Wayne Parrish sold honey at the last Farmers Market and that a lot of kids were present. The question was asked if members are able to sale honey only on our Saturday of the month, or if we can also sale on Tuesdays and/or Thursdays. Although it was thought that we could sale on both Tuesdays and Thursdays, the market board has agreed to our Saturday and Tuesdays and not on Thursdays. Our next Saturday at the market will be on August 10th.

Franklin County Fair – Jack Kuhn won First Prize Blue Ribbons for all the categories that he entered. Honey Judge, Tana Peers, awarded the Grand Prize Best of Show Ribbon to our display. Needless to say she was impressed.

Old Business:

On behalf of George Fowler, Wes reminded the members of the upcoming Spellapalooza on August 9th. This event supports the Thorn Hill Education Center in their adult education programs. George invites all who are interested to join him at a table to provide information and to sale honey. Fifteen percent of the honey sales go to support the Center.

picked up by those who ordered them.

Wes provided a brief summary of the KSBA summer meeting. Tammy Potter provided information regarding American Foul Brood. She has had twenty-one cases in her tenure as State Apiarist. Test kits for AFB are available at Dadant & Sons and it can be treated with BroodSafe. Tammy also said that to help prevent AFB in our colonies, we should not re-use black comb or feed bees with the honey of another colony. The Honey Bee Health Coalition's webpage is an excellent source of information for all bee health issues.

Also mentioned at the summer meeting were the need for 250 eight-ounce bottles of honey for the Farm Bureau breakfast; guidelines for the two State Fair Honey Booths; KSBA needs a Secretary, Treasurer and Legislative Representative; a meeting for Certified Honey Producers and the presidents of member organizations will be held on August 3rd and the Fall KSBA Meeting will be held on November 9th in Shepherdsville.

Once again, for those of us who will be volunteering to man the State Fair Honey Booth, will meet at the Frankfort Walmart at 7 a.m. on August 20th. The July issue of Beelines contains more information regarding the State Fair.

New Business:

The Frankfort Library has requested that a club member to speak to an audience of mostly children on Tuesday, August 6th, at 6:30 p.m. We appreciate Kay Daniels volunteering to honor this requested.

The meeting was adjourned at 6:50 p.m.
