2021 Candlelight Tradition



One activity and needful thing if you’ve collected burr comb or have capping from extracting is the rendering and using the precious wax. With colony manipulations at a stand still, we now have the time to clean and use this other commodity of beekeeping. Wax has a plethora of uses most commonly that of candle making and reading by candle-light made with the wax from your own hive is a treasure unto itself.



10 Fast & Fabulous Ways to Cook with Honey

1. Mix equal parts honey and soy sauce and add ginger and garlic. Brush on salmon or chicken before roasting or grilling.
2. Use in your favorite granola recipe.
3. Toss cubes of roasted sweet potatoes with honey and red pepper flakes.

4. Make a honey mustard dipping sauce for chicken wings with equal parts honey, mustard, and mayonnaise.
 5. Brush over fresh pineapple slices and run under the broiler.
 6. Drizzle into your favorite Old Forge Bourbon cocktail.
 7. Use instead of molasses in gingerbread and instead of corn syrup in pecan pie.
 8. Pour over pancakes, scones, or buttered cornbread.
 9. Drizzle over Manchego, Cheddar, or blue cheese.

apiary. Heat rising from the cluster can get trapped and drip onto the cluster. A simple popsicle stick can save a colony from this dilemma. Placed under the inner or top cover, allows just enough space for condensation to escape. Some folks also use straw or woodchips in a screened-bottom box (quill box) under the top cover.
