Winter Arrives

moderate Fall temperatures keepers should have had ample opportunity to prepare their apiaries for the winter that would surely come. Come it did in the past weeks of this writing. The mercury dipped low into the teens at night and only in the twenties and thirties for the daily highs have occurred and are continuing. Winter patties/ candy boards placed above the cluster should be on to supplement feeding. Remember, patties can be slipped quickly in even in cold weather. Other preparations that should have already been made include mouse guards and entrance reducers. Clustered bees, a gaping unprotected entrance, and a warm, dry place with wax and honey for food, what more could a brown field-mouse want? Come spring the furry squatter's mess will be evident. So if you haven't done it, get those guards on and protect your equipment and the colony's stores. At the December Meeting of The Bluegrass Beekeepers, former State Apiarist Phil Craft warned of putting liquid feed (sugar syrup/ fructose) in the hive this time of year. "It puts moisture in the hive", he warned. And moisture is definitely one thing we do not need an excess of in winter. Remember to also ventilate the hive just slightly with something like popsicle sticks between the inner and outter telescoping cover.

CCBA Minutes 28 November 2017

President Ken Daniels called the meeting to order at 6:08 p.m.

He asked for a motion to accept the October minutes. The motion to accept was made by Wayne Parrish, second by John Antenucci.

Treasure Jack Kuhn presented the treasurer's report. [Beginning balance- 2554.01, total receipts- 199.00, total expenditures— 567.13, ending balance- 2185.88.]

President Daniels reported on the potluck dinner at our October meeting. It was attended by 43 people who enjoyed good food and an informative presentation by Kevin Hale. Unfortunately everyone was so involved with the night's activities that no one remembered to take pictures.

Next President Daniels introduced Andrew Fogg, the new manager of Dadant's Frankfort branch. Andrew said that Dadant is a little behind the curve but is gearing up and working to make up for lost time. Dadant will be taking orders around 15 December for about 500 packages of bees. Nucs will also be available, but at this time he is not sure of how many. They are also looking for a queen supplier, so if any one knows of a supplier, they should contact Andrew. The cost for packages will be about \$125 and Nucs will be about \$185. Packages should be available for pick-up on or about 16 April. More information will be forthcoming. Dadant does have syrup in stock, but their supply of winter patties is low. However, they will be receiving a large shipment of patties this coming Monday (4 Dec.) Currently our club members are the only people who will continue to receive a 5% on purchases.

This year's Holiday Farmers' Market will be Saturday, 9 December from 11 a.m. until 2 p.m. It will also be Kids Day and should be well attended unless it's extremely cold. Honey is very popular at the Market and any members who have honey for sale are encouraged to attend. If you would like to sell honey there, please contact President Daniels.

President Daniels said that at the Candlelight Tour on 10 and 11 November went well. Two club members sold product along with a honey tasting. There was a lot of interest and questions from the public and honey recipes were distributed.

The annual Bluegrass Beekeeping School will be held on 10 March at Kentucky State Univ. The school is presented as a joint effort of the Bluegrass Beekeepers Association and our club. Each club supplies about half of the speakers and are hoping to expand on the number of topics and speakers. A planning meeting will be held at 6p.m. on 11 December at the Fayette County Extension Office in Lexington. Interested club members are encouraged to attend. We will meet in Frankfort around 5p.m. that afternoon. Our participating members are invit-

ed to stay for the Bluegrass Beekeepers monthly meeting and potluck dinner. Anyone interested in attending should contact Ken Daniels for more details.

In conjunction with the Beekeeping School, our club will conduct its most important event, Bee Friendly Frankfort. At a yet to be determined date, there will be planning meeting at the Franklin County Extension Office. John Antenucci provided a brief history of this event and explained its importance in disseminating information about bees, local beekeeping and beekeepers, local honey and the plight of pollinators to our community. Activities involved with this event are hive paintings by local schools for auction at the bee school, participation by local businesses in advertising, and participation by local restaurants featuring dishes made with honey. The highlight of Bee Friendly Frankfort is the attendance of the annual American Honey Queen or Princess. This representative of the American Beekeeping Federation has in the past spoken to schools, local organizations, Kentucky legislators and participated in the Beekeeping School.

President Daniels made a call for volunteers to oversee or assist in various activities for Bee Friendly Frankfort and said that we are always open for ideas for new activities.

Starting with this meeting, club dues for 2018 is being accepted. Club dues is \$10 per member. Each member is also eligible for membership in the Kentucky State Beekeepers Association for an additional \$15. For every member that joins the KSBA through the club, our club receives \$2. The KSBA has three meetings per year, publishes a newsletter along with their website, puts on the Honey Booth each year at the State Fair and provides useful information to its members.

President Daniels announced the proposed officers for 2018. In the past the club has called for nominations and volunteers with limited success. So this year individuals were approached for their willingness to serve. The proposed officers are Wes Henry as President, Ken Daniels as Vice President, George Fowler as Treasurer and Jan Rafert as Secretary. President Daniels also announced the new position of Program Chairperson. This position will be filled by Jack Kuhn. These potential nominations were then opened for discussion and approval. No discussion ensued and a motion to approve was made by John Antenucci and seconded by Eddie McNutt.

Following the business portion of the meeting, Jack Kuhn provided a most informative presentation on the use of Oxalic Acid using the dribble method, winter hive management and feeding and the Federal Conservation Reserve Program.
