Some included the monthly CCBA honey booth at The Franklin County Farmer's Market, The Candlelight Tour honey booth, The Ky. State Fair Honey booth, CCBA Annual Potluck, the planning and execution of the Annual Bluegrass Beekeepers Bee School and Bee-Friendly activities associated with it, and many other functions and needs of the club. Each month He, Kay, and Dan ensured that the snacks were setup at the monthly meetings providing an added bonus to the fellowship time during our gatherings.

Stacey Luddke, retired art teacher of Collins Lane Elementary, dedicated her painted hive body in memory of Ken which will be on display in the foyer of the Franklin County Extension Office for a time. His friendship, and dedication will be deeply missed and is indeed something for each member to remember and challenged to duplicate. - "Tell the Bees"

GOT BROOD? IN YOUR SUPER THAT IS

If you find that you have brood in your honey super the problem is easily remedied. This is a

great use of a queen excluder. Simply remove the frames and look for the queen on each frame and if she is not found then shake the bees from that frame into the brood chamber. If you find the queen, simply place her back into the brood box and add the queen excluder between the brood chamber and the honey supers. Check and shake each frame if she is not found. The idea is to make sure the queen is below the excluder if you missed her. The brood will all emerge in three weeks and hopefully the bees will backfill the empty cells with honey.



Why didn't I think of that?

1865, Major Franz Elder von Hruschka, an Austrian who later moved near Inventor of Honey Extractor Venice, Italy invented the extractor when he saw his


son swing a comb of honey in a basket and noticed the honey was thrown from the comb.

Before the extractor, honey was sold in the comb or the comb was crushed and the honey drained.

Langstroth said it best of the innovation-"...a plan devised...for emptying the honey from the comb, without injuring the comb."
