Take full advantage of the CCBA Library! With the down-time winter brings, a crackling fire, hot beverage, and a warm and comfortable chair, a good bee-read for the 'keep's hard to beat.





- As a late season cleanup on mites, treatment with OA (Oxolic Acid) works best now because the colonies are now mostly broodless. (Jack Kuhn to do presentation on its use at November 28th meeting)
- Properly store "cleaned" surplus honey comb to prevent moth and but now especially, mouse damage.
- Check stores. Feed "winter patty's", sugar blocks, etc. Place on top bars ٠
- Install mouse guards on the entrances. They love a warm dry place in winter with lots of food.

## A Quick and Easy Winter-Feed

Recipe

An economical, useful, and easy recipe for winter feed for bees from Chris Palmer. 24/25 lbs. sugar

3tbs citric acid 1qt. apple cider vinegar

Smaller Batch for use 1-2 wintering colonies:

4 pounds of sugar 1 1/2 teaspoon - Citric acid 2/3 cup Apple Cider Vinegar

Mix to a snowball like consistency.

Add a sheet of newspaper over top bars, add 2" shim or empty super on top of hive box.

Put sugar feed onto newspaper and cover with lid. Bees will chew through the paper to get to the sugar (see Picture right).
